After taking a long hard look at our options, we on the alumni board have come to realize that the only way to ensure the overall functionality of the facility is a full renovation of the property. So with this in mind, we have begun the initial stages of a campaign to transform the Lambda Chapter House into a fully modernized facility that meets the needs of this, and ideally next generation's students.

The chapter house should be something that we can all feel a fond connection to, reminding us of our youth and our shared experiences there. And it should represent the values of KDR, so that when we bring our families to visit for homecoming or Cal Day we can proudly say "this was my home."

I hope you are as excited as I am as we begin this
