

Congratulations to Ryan and Ben and to the men of Lambda Chapter for their efforts and recognitions.


KDR Goes Green

If you haven't noticed yet, things have been looking a little greener around the chapter house lately. It started last spring when Sophomore **Kia Hamzelou** sparked interest with some brothers to work in making our house more environmentally sustainable. He personally lobbied to create two new house positions, Sustainability Chair and House Gardener. Kia's actions have had more widespread implications: a newfound commitment of the brothers to creating sustainability throughout the Greek community at Cal.

As the first Sustainability Chair, Kia implemented a house-wide recycling program with the cash redemption proceeds going to buying school supplies for underprivileged children in the Philippines. Future plans for this position include composting organic waste such as food and biodegradable food containers.

While making the house sustainable was Kia's brainchild, many other brothers have also started thinking green. Sophomore **Timothy Maloney**, as House Manager, coordinated a project to plant a hedge of Japanese Boxwood shrubs in place of the railroad ties. **Constandinos Karras**, also a Sophomore, is working on constructing large box-planters for the South-facing 2nd floor deck and re-finishing some wood benches so that a once seldom-used deck can be reborn as a flourishing garden.




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Lambda Chapter

However, as with all major plans for changes in an organization, there is a learning curve involved. We tried to capitalize on a solar energy paneling pilot program spearheaded by the City of Berkeley. Ultimately it was unsuccessful despite Junior Piotr Kula's persistent efforts. Said Piotr, "While our application was not one of the 20 accepted by the City, if their program is successful and they expand the offer to include other applicants we can certainly be the first fraternity in Berkeley with solar paneling."

Piotr's comments also illustrate another important point: the Greek community at Cal has been slow to act in response to growing environmental awareness as compared to their on-campus and student cooperative housing counterparts. Which is exactly why the current generation of Lambda Chapter actives have made promoting sustainability throughout the Greek community a primary goal.

Chapter Academics A Priority by Ryan Roleson

66 There are three things you can do during L college," someone once told me. "You can have a social life, study, or sleep-but you can only do two of them well." Since our studies mark the original reason for going to college, and also because socializing in college can take on a life of its own, sleep has been the traditional sacrifice of the university years.

Whether it is a result of pulling repeated all-nighters in order to catch up on homework or whether those all-nighters began with a can of beer the previous evening, sleep tends to sit by the sidelines while the rest of college life is played out on the field. Yet just like paying too little attention to school makes us dread the next midterm, and inadequate time socializing can deprive us of the social skills needed in the professional realm, sleep-deprivation, too, has its consequences.

We as students find ourselves bouncing between activities, trying sometimes in desperation simply to maintain a bare minimum of activity in each of these three dimensions of college life. What can we do in order to find a balance, especially as we prepare ourselves for "the real world"?

This past fall, Lambda's scholarship activities focused on just that-balance. Based on the idea that study skills require strong overall personal management, we created activities aimed at learning to integrate all aspects of student life. Those three aspects described above, dramatically interact and affect each other; balance is needed to perform

well, and this in turn requires that we organize ourselves efficiently.

As during the previous semester, brothers created presentations on subjects related to study skills and personal management. Yet unlike the spring, our fall program took as its guide the celebrated book The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People, by Stephen Covey. Incorporating material discussed therein, brothers designed group activities to go along with presentations. Often in discussion format, activities focused on topics such as weekly prioritizing and goal setting.

Additionally, brothers made topics relevant to fraternity life, providing another format to improve the workings of our brotherhood. Underlying our activities was a feeling of control over the many things a college student does, opposed to letting ourselves rocket between them in a disorganized effort to 'do it all'. Above all, we emphasized that improvements in one area of our lives requires improvements in all, as each is connected to the others.

Bearing in mind the central importance of studying, yet also remembering that every student participates in a variety of activities in college, our Fall scholarship program focused on efficient self-organization; for not only will we be more effective in the three areas mentioned above, but we will also be more prepared for when we have to balance more than these three activities.
