From the President

Welcome to the Winter 2010 Lambda Lyre! I hope your holiday season was one of happiness and joy, and of family and friends. I personally had the opportunity to see some KDR brothers that I hadn't seen in quite a while and really appreciated the chance to share stories and hear the news in their lives.

As we move fully into 2010, I've got some important announcements regarding what has been going on with the Lambda Chapter. A decision was taken by the brothers of the chapter to fully restructure the fraternity. Essentially what this means is that the chapter will become dormant for a short period of time (6-18 months) while we focus on improving the overall fraternity experience for the undergraduates. This process will involve increasing revenue, ensuring that

the chapter house is structurally sound, renovating the bedrooms and common areas of the chapter house, and finally, reorganizing the chapter.

I want to assure everyone that the chapter is in good standing with both the university and with the national fraternity, and will not have any issues with either once the decision to reorganize is made. The reasons behind this move are difficult to fully explain in the space here, but I'll just summarize by saying that the chapter was trending in an unsatisfactory direction on several fronts, and it didn't seem possible to create the strong chapter KDR deserves without starting fresh.

This decision was not an easy one to make by anyone involved, but I am convinced that the long-term results will be wholeheartedly positive. We have a core group of dedicated alumni who are committed to seeing this process through successfully. **Brian Lewis '99** is leading

Before there was Michael Phelps, there was Peter Rocca




It's been 30 years since Peter helped Cal capture their first national swimming title in 1979, but his involvement and impact on Cal's swimming program is still evident today. Peter was a three-time All-American for the Bears, set school records, earned All-American honors in 17 different events during his

college career and captured the silver medal in both the 100- and 200-meter backstroke in the 1976 Montreal Olympics. His dedication to his alma mater and the swim team that helped him make it to two Olympic Games (he qualified for the 1980 Olympics, however the USA boycotted the games in Moscow) helped him to establish a scholarship in honor of his former coach, Nort Thornton.

The Nort Thornton Scholarship is awarded annually to the swimmer who exemplifies the qualities of Discipline, Responsibility, Leadership, and hard Work, and to help Create an Environment Where Champions are Inevitable. Peter recalls, "Being a NCAA DI swimmer at Cal was tremendous, but challenging experience during my time at Cal. It was my freshman year at Cal, under the tutelage of Nort Thornton, that gave me the needed conditioning and experience to

make the 1976 Olympic team. I owe so much to the program at Cal and for the guidance that Nort gave to me".





sophomore year in 1976 because a roommate of his was a member and another one of his roommates joined with him. Most students have to worry about pledging the fraternity and keep up their grades. Peter had to worry about also training for the Olympics while at KDR. Peter was never a Chapter officer, and because of the early mornings and rigors of competing in swimming and water polo, he chose not to not live in the fraternity

The remaining undergraduate Brothers met with our Alumni Board and decided that our wisest course of action would be to start anew sometime in the future.

Seeing our Fraternity become inactive is truly heartbreaking, but it needs to happen. It will allow time for old wounds to heal and when the Lambda rises once again, she will be stronger because of it. It is critical that we take to heart the lessons we learned as our Chapter declined and take action to ensure we will not fall into the same traps when we return. The relationship between undergraduate Brothers, our Alumni Brothers, and the National Fraternity must remain as strong as we have cultivated it to be in these past few semesters. I am confident that none of this will be forgotten, as our dedicated brothers become dedicated Alumni that will watch over Lambda until she reactivates.

I call out to those of you who want to see the Lambda whole again but have not had a chance to take on an active role—come visit our Chapter. This coming semester there will still be Brothers, including myself, caring for our chapter house. We will need to build a solid foundation in order to restart in the upcoming semesters, and to do that we will need as many Brothers as are able. Together we will not let Lambda fall; we will carry her until she can stand again. I look forward to hearing from those of you who are interested in keeping the Lambda Chapter as the jewel of the west coast.

Thank you, my Brothers, for making me who I am today: a leader, a Brother, and a true Kappa Delta Rho gentleman. Honor Super Omnia.
